- 1. Childhood cancer is not one disease but several. You can learn more about the different types of childhood cancer, including brain tumors, leukemia and other solid tumors like neuroblastoma here.
- 2. Every day, there are almost 700 new cases of childhood cancer around the world. This is equivalent to an entire elementary school of children. This adds up to over 250,000 new cases of cancer each year in children under the age of 20.

- 3. Childhood cancer is the leading cause of death by disease in children in the United States. Every day, 250 children around the world die from cancer. Each year, 91,250 children lose their lives to cancer. Last year, brain tumors overtook leukemia as the deadliest cause of death by cancer. Long term survival rates continue to increase, but not fast enough to <u>save</u> the thousands of children who will die at the hands of cancer.
- 4. Childhood cancer treatment is no longer just chemotherapy and radiation. Cancer treatments are always changing and becoming more targeted. Precise therapies, like <u>Car T cell immunotherapy</u>, that attack the genetic components and drivers of cancer are offering more hope than ever before.
- 5. A cure is not enough. Surviving childhood cancer brings its own set of complications. Two-thirds of all childhood cancer patients will have long lasting chronic conditions from treatment. Advancements in treatment have increased survival rates. However, the treatment can lead to late term effects including chronic health conditions or struggles with learning and cognitive impairment.
- 6. Data and collaboration will lead to cures. ALSF has funded over 800 research grants—bringing together the innovative and brilliant minds of childhood cancer researchers. This year, ALSF opened the Childhood Cancer Data Lab(CCDL). The CCDL team will collect and analyze the vast wealth of data already available while integrating discoveries from ALSF-funded researchers and many others.
- 7. Families often must to travel for cancer treatment.
 Fortunately for families in our area we have the Ronald McDonald House in Hershey where they can stay at no cost while their children are receiving treatment. Ever wonder why the Childhood Cancer Awareness ribbon is gold? In 1997, a group of parents picked gold as the official color because it symbolizes how precious children are and their resiliency.
- Children, like gold, are precious and strong. Ever wonder why the Childhood Cancer Awareness ribbon is gold? In 1997, a group of parents picked gold as the official color because it symbolizes how precious children are and their resiliency.
- 9. There is hope. While childhood cancer is consistently underfunded at the government level, your support of research projects for all types of childhood cancer is bringing us closer to cures than ever before. There are children alive today that would not be because of our supporters' dedication to finding cures for all children, one cup at a time.
- Cups, miles and donations lead to cures. The founder, Alex Scott, started Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation with one front yard lemonade stand. It all started with one cup of lemonade.

Research is the key to end cancers attacks on our children. We as Pennsylvania Lions, Lioness, and Leos have pledged to raise funds under "Pennsylvania Lions Care for the Kids". We are raising funds for the Four Diamonds project. Much of the fund rising comes from the THON dances that are held across the state. Please consider donating to this worthwhile cause. If a young child can make a difference by fundraising by selling cups of lemonade, please consider what your clubs can do to raise funds to continue childhood cancer research and wear a gold ribbon to help raise awareness.

SORTING RECYCLED EYEGLASSES

Many Clubs collect used eyeglasses in their community. This is a great visible ongoing service project that benefits many individuals across the globe. Clubs can sort the eyeglasses as a service project at a meeting. This gets everyone involved in the project. There are 3 categories you sort the eyeglasses into: prescription eyeglasses; sunglasses; readers. Cases, broken eyeglasses, loose lens can be thrown away, if you are able to do so. If not, please place in separate container and I will dispose of them. Use sturdy, reasonable size boxes to place the sorted glasses. Eyeglasses can be dropped off at my house, 6088 Molly Pitcher Hwy South, Chambersburg or at the PA State Lions Office, 949 East Park Drive, Harrisburg. Eyeglasses collected are taken semiyearly to the New Jersey Lions Eyeglasses Recycling Center in Trenton, New Jersey. There, volunteers clean, prescribe, and bag eyeglasses to be used on medical mission trips in many countries. You can find out more at www.njlerc.org. ENVIRONMENTAL CHAIR MESSAGE

Dear Lions, Lionesses, and Leos,

The greatest threat to wildlife is the loss of habitat. The constant increase in human population creates a constant demand for more resources and as a result many species must either adapt or disappear completely.

One such specie in need of our help is the purple martin. These birds are migratory and spend our winter months as far away as Brazil and Bolivia in South America. As our days get longer and temperatures warm they return to our area where they feed on the flying insects that begin to reappear in spring. "Scouts" arrive first to search for suitable nesting sites and that's where the problem comes in. Traditionally these birds nested in tree cavities created by woodpeckers but over the years they have adapted to manmade nesting structures. Today it is estimated that purple martins in the eastern U.S. are 100% reliant upon these structures. Now I ask you, how many purple martin nesting structures are you aware of in your areas? And of those, how many actually have martins using them and not the more common and often destructive European starlings or English sparrows.

Within our district in Juniata County, near the village of Honey Grove, a concerned teacher had purchased the materials and erected the nests in front of the elementary school a few years ago and what do you know? The scouts eventually found the site and for the past several years martins have been successfully raising young there.

Earlier this spring however the school closed its doors and both the building and property were purchased by the township. Reluctantly, the teacher removed the nests and then erected them near his home in Huntingdon County with hopes of attracting purple martins there. When the scouts returned to the school in April they had no nesting structures awaiting them.

After making a few phone calls and doing a little research I have obtained permission from Tuscarora Township to return nesting structures to the site. The Pennsylvania Game Commission and the Juniata Valley Audubon Society have both agreed to partner with the Lions of District 14-T in the purchasing and installation of new nesting structures so that when the scouts come looking next spring the nests will be in place.

The total cost of the project will be approximately \$1620.00. Approximately \$500 has already been donated leaving a balance of \$1120.00. If your club would like to participate in the project to return the purple martin nesting structures to Tuscarora Township please send your donation to me. Checks should be made out to the "Juniata Valley Audubon Society" or just "JVAS" and mailed to Lion Steve Hower, 7599 Raccoon Valley Road, Millerstown, PA 17062. Any funds raised in excess of the amount needed will go toward other Audubon Society projects.

Upon the completion of this project I envision a very positive news release highlighting the involvement of the Lions Clubs of District 14-T. Thank you for considering a donation!







BUCHANAN LIONESS
