GLOBAL SERVICE TEAM MESSAGE

Let's discuss **Recycling Eyeglasses** this month...

With COVID-19 putting the brakes on many of our Lions activities, our clubs are looking for ways to "safely" serve.

There is a wealth of information to be found in **LCI's Resource Center**.

1. Go to lionsclubs.org
2. Click on **Resources for Member**
3. Click on **Resource Center**
4. Scroll down and click on **Service Activities**
5. Scroll through the **100 Resources** – looking for sources related to **Recycling Eyeglasses**

Here, resources include brochures, posters, labels, news releases, collection boxes and much more – all to help you with **Eyeglass Recycling**.

Has your Club partnered with your local eye doctors, local churches, local schools, local businesses, local sports venues? The list is endless.

Did you know that you can "recognize" those partners with a "Certificate of Appreciation" – publication number – "iad405".

Eyeglass collection boxes can be ordered from the "LCI Shop," but if your Club doesn't need a case of 10 boxes, I have some available at the Lions State Office.

A shorter version of **Resources** can be found by going to lionsclubs.org and searching for **Eyeglass Recycling**.

Once your recycling boxes are placed at various locations throughout your community – please make sure to check them at least monthly.

Count your recycled glasses and then report that number with your Club's activities using MyLION.

Your Club can present them to the District Governor during the Official Visit OR deliver them to PDG Joann Williams OR deliver them to the Lions State Office.

Your recycled eyeglasses will make their final journey on a mission trip giving corrected vision to those in need in underdeveloped countries around the world.

COLLECTING/PRESORTING EYEGLASSES

Collecting eyeglasses is a service project that many Clubs in our District are involved with. I wanted to share with you information about where those collected eyeglasses go as well as how you can presort the eyeglasses as a club project. Collected eyeglasses are taken to the New Jersey Lions Eyeglasses Recycling Center. It is located on the grounds of Katzenbach School for the Deaf in West Trenton, New Jersey. This is one of eleven recycling centers located in the United States. Yearly, they handle 1,200,000 eyeglasses. Their purpose is twofold: to collect, clean, neutralize, designate prescriptions of used eyeglasses and to store and package them for distribution to needy groups and individuals throughout the world. Volunteers include students at the school, lion members, other organizations, inmates at local correctional institution. For more info, check out their website www.njlerc.org

If you are aware of medical mission groups who provide vision exams, there is a form on the website for them to order eyeglasses to take along.

If your Club chooses to presort, here are some helpful tips. Please throw away: eyeglass cases, broken eyeglasses, loose lens. If you have a way of disposing these items, please do so. If not, box together and I will throw away. Box eyeglasses and sunglasses separately as well as reading glasses. Mark on box the contents: Prescription/Sunglasses/Readers. Do not fill box completely to the top. Glasses will get broken in transit. Use sturdy boxes for storage. Do not use extra large boxes as they become too heavy to lift and maneuver. Hearing aids are also collected and given to PA Lions Hearing Research Committee who provide them to a research lab in Western PA.

You can bring collected eyeglasses to District Meetings for pickup; drop off at PA Lions State Office, 949 East Park Drive, Harrisburg; drop off at my home, 6088 Molly Pitcher Hwy South, Chambersburg.

NORTH AMERICAN MEMBERSHIP INITIATIVE (NAMI)

We continue to move forward. These words can apply to so many aspects of our lives these days, both as Lions and beyond. I'm proud to say that when it comes to the North American Membership Initiative (NAMI) in District 14-T that we are doing so as well.

In previous updates, you've heard about why we have NAMI and why it's so important (so we can reverse 35+ years of membership declines in North America). After our teams identify their goals, which we've discussed need to be achievable and reasonable for this year, they will also identify the specific steps (or plans) to realize those goals. It's important to note that these goals will be very tangible and actionable and will involve our clubs. We want to take positive steps to improve where we can and to support our clubs in real ways. We are all in service together, and we all have a role to play in moving forward as Lions.

So how can you help as we take these next steps? If you are contacted by one of our teams, I ask you to be collaborative and cooperative. Please be open to engaging with our teams, provide them with information I when they ask, and consider participating. If you have any questions, I encourage you to contact myself or District Governor Cathy so we can do what makes sense to help our clubs and district.

I realize that the current pandemic can make even basic club functions difficult. We all feel the challenges. I encourage you to stay connected as clubs and adjust your focus to conduct fundraisers and service projects that make sense at this time. If you have any questions about virtual meetings, I'm also happy to help you directly as our Technology Chairperson. Each club needs to decide what's best for themselves, but nothing will happen if we don't try.

I will continue to provide updates as our teams make progress. As our District Governor says, "Bee the Change". I wish you all the best as we move to wrapping 2020 for good and moving onto 2021.

Lastly, I thank our team leaders: VDG Tom Ralston, PDG Kathy Fouse, and PDG Sam Wagner (doing double duty) and their teams for their focus on this critical initiative, and DG Cathy for her support and commitment.



ADOPT A SOLDIER!

Dear Council Chairwoman Marilyn Wagner, District Governors, Partners in Service, GST Tom Gregg, State Administrator Lion Bob McComas and District Newsletter Editors;

I am writing to you regarding the PA Lions Adopt A Soldier Project and the continuing efforts to make this project a statewide initiative.

I am very pleased to say that we have received the overseas contact information in order to mail the boxes to the soldiers. Thank you to ID Larry and Lion Susan Edwards for their efforts in obtaining the address allowing us to move ahead earlier this year, as well as their confidence in asking me to chair this project.

When I started this project about 3 years ago within my local area and with 2 Lions Clubs, we rallied the community to join us and had great success. We have been doing it ever since and have shared the idea with our District and others across the state. Last year I had the goal of seeing it go statewide when I heard there was a platoon of 800 PA soldiers overseas. I contacted each Governor explaining what we were trying to achieve but due to the short notice in receiving the shipping addresses, some Districts were unable to participate. Statewide last year we sent approximately 400 boxes overseas to PA soldiers, and that was on very short notice.

This year when I was asked by ID Larry to help promote this project statewide and make it a bigger success, I was determined to obtain the shipping address earlier and thanks to ID Larry and Lion Susan, that has happened.

We have decided to divide up the state by region, giving each region one shipping address (we received 3) thereby allowing adjoining Districts and Clubs to work together in utilizing the resources of their communities and hopefully being able to receive more donations. I'm asking if you could share this information with the clubs in your District and publish it in your newsletters as well. We even had clubs include their Leo Clubs. Not only did they donate boxes, they helped with the packing, sealing and preparing to ship. I'm including a flyer we used to promote it and since it's a word document, it can be modified with each district or clubs specific information as well as contact information for any questions. I was also asked to share some tips on how we were able to get the community onboard with us.

PUBLICIZING: If I had only sent this project information out to my club members, we might have gotten 20-25 boxes donated. So I decided to appeal to our local community by writing up what we were doing, attaching a picture of our flyer which lists suggested items to be included in the boxes, and putting it on a "locals" Facebook page. I also put it on my church Facebook page, some local yard sale site pages and asked all my friends and fellow club members to share it to their friends as well. The response was incredible - the first year we sent out over 60 boxes and last year it was 95 boxes. I used social media to my advantage. I also listed my phone number on the flyer so I could answer any questions, as well as used my address as the drop off location. Providing them with multiple contacts and drop-off locations could add confusion.

BOXES: When anyone expressed interest in participating, I had them get a **medium size flat rate box from the post office** (I also picked up 50 boxes from the post office and left them on my front porch so anyone could pick up a box from me if they needed it. Also some people dropped off their donations in bags so I would box them). Having a uniform size box helped not only fitting everything into them but in transporting them to the post office. I asked everyone to bring the boxes unsealed so I could inspect them to make sure there was no unapproved items included since I was signing the custom forms and so I knew what was in the box to include on the customs form. I then sealed them with good clear packaging tape, attached the mailing address (the post office will give you priority mail address labels for free) and the completed custom form.

SHIPPING COSTS: The charge for shipping the medium flat rate box is \$15.05 this year (military rate to an APO address - make sure to specify that it's military rate at the post office). When someone stated they wanted to Adopt A Soldier I gave them all the information and also asked them to include the cost of shipping. I told them they could give me cash or a check made out to my Lions club and it could be a tax write-off for them. My club then gave me one check in the end when we took all the boxes to the post office to be shipped. Some people even gave extra money to pay for someone else's shipping costs. In the end this highly successful and worthwhile project cost our club nothing financially but has given us so much in terms of goodwill, positive publicity and new member interest. A Win-Win!

CUSTOM FORMS: Make sure to talk to your local post office and get the most up to date custom forms. Ask them how they want them filled out and they may even give you examples. Our post office was happy to work with us and help us. One post office after hearing what we were doing, even had an employee volunteer to help fill out the custom forms and they processed the boxes as well. Also see under BOXES some information on custom forms.

FOLLOWUP THANK YOU POSTS: I always made sure to post on each Facebook page that I had publicized this project on, how helpful the post office had been as well as thanking the community for their donations. I also took pictures at the post office of us bringing all the boxes in, posted those pictures and told everyone how many we were actually able to send out. It has brought us repeat donators as well as interest in our club.

CUT OFF DATE: You will each need to decide what your last date to accept donations will be but keep in mind that the **post office usually wants all military mailings out by the end of the first week in December to make sure they will be delivered before Christmas.** I would never turn down a box if someone needed more time. The way I looked at was even if it was late getting there, it was better late than never.

ITEMS: I will attach the flyer that was made up to give suggestions of acceptable items. Remember it could be a male or female soldier. Each year I've been amazed at the ingenuity of some people in including things I would never think of. I received lovely thank you notes 2 out of the 3 years we have done it. It also helps to include a little note from your local Lions club noting this a Lions project and since these boxes are all going to PA Soldiers who are currently overseas, they may feel inclined to search out the Lions club in their local community when they return stateside. We can always use more members, right!!

I know this is lengthy and I apologize, but I wanted to make sure you had as much information as possible. I hope you will all embrace this statewide project and show your communities "We Serve" is our motto and what a better way then sending some PA love to a PA soldier who is serving very very far from home.




