Welcome to October and fall has arrived (at least in the chilly air). Many service projects and much fundraising are taking place all across our District. Please keep up the good work.



Other counties with the heaviest flooding include Breathitt, Clay, Floyd, Johnson, Knott, Leslie, Letcher, Martin, Owsley, Wolfe, Pike and Magoffin.

We, as Lions, are called on, once again, to serve those in dire need to recover from the destructive storms. Consequently, the PA Lion's Disaster Relief Team has been working with Lion leaders in the various districts in eastern Kentucky to develop a plan to get the necessary items to help in their recovery efforts.

FROM OUR ENVIRONMENTAL CHAIR

Greetings District Members. I hope this finds everyone well and making the most of our diminishing daylight.

So that you're aware, we will be having an environment photo contest similar to the one that we had last year. Photos will be submitted in March and the winner will be announced at the district convention. The most notable change is that photos will be a larger size. Voting will again occur at the district website. This also serves as a public relations effort for the district. More information will be forthcoming.

With fall upon us, there are a few gardening activities that can help the environment. Some gardeners may feel compelled to clean out debris from their flower and vegetable beds. Provided you're not restricted by local ordinances or HOA rules, you can leave your flower and vegetable bed debris until the spring. This is sometimes referred to as "messy gardening" and it helps provide pollinators such as birds with food sources during the winter months. Allowing fallen leaves to remain in your beds also adds to the soil health and contributes to the food sources of foraging birds in the spring. Depending on spring temperatures, mid-April is an ideal time to start removing some of the debris. I continue to leave some of the fallen leaves, especially for the American robin, which is considered a symbol of spring. As omnivores, they search for small invertebrates amongst the fallen leaves in the spring. Other garden activities that help the environment include composting garden beds, mulch or cover for garden beds, planting cover crops that can help reduce soil erosion, and cleaning and storing garden tools.

If you're looking for an activity for your club members, or perhaps family members, and especially kids, there's a fun, indoor activity with an environmental focus: How To Make Wildflower Seed Bombs With Air Dry Clay (practicallyfunctional.com) Seed bombing, also known as guerilla gardening, is quick, fun, and impactful. The aforementioned link provides the recipe (wildflower seeds, air dry clay, garden soil, water, cookie sheet, mixing bowl, and parchment paper). Simply mix all ingredients together and roll into 1" balls and place on the parchment paper to dry for 1-2 days. Each ball contains sufficient seeds to cover a 1-2 square foot area. With the right native seeds, you can provide continuous blooming nectar plants for pollinators. These can be disbursed in late fall or early spring. Ideal locations for disbursement include areas where the native vegetation has been removed, vacant lots, roadsides, etc. but not in established botanical gardens. The fun part of this is returning a few months later to see what has germinated.

HOW TO PRESORT EYEGLASSES

Collecting eyeglasses is a service project that many Clubs in our District are involved with. I wanted to share with you information about where those collected eyeglasses go as well as how you can presort the eyeglasses as a club project. Collected eyeglasses are taken to the New Jersey Lions Eyeglasses Recycling Center. It is located on the grounds of Katzenbach School for the Deaf in West Trenton, New Jersey. This is one of eleven recycling centers located in the United States. Yearly, they handle 1,200,000 eyeglasses. Their purpose is twofold: to collect, clean, neutralize, designate prescriptions of used eyeglasses and to store and package them for distribution to needy groups and individuals throughout the world. Volunteers include students at the school, lion members, other organizations, inmates at local correctional institution. For more info, check out their website www.nilerc.org If you are aware of medical mission groups who provide vision exams, there is a form on the website for them to order eyeglasses to take along.

If your Club chooses to presort, here are some helpful tips.

Please throw away: eyeglass cases, broken eyeglasses, loose lens, contact lens. If you have a way of disposing these items, please do so. If not, box together and I will throw away. Box eyeglasses and sunglasses separately as well as reading glasses. Mark on box the contents: Prescription/Sunglasses/Readers.

Do not fill box completely to the top. Glasses will get broken in transit. Use sturdy boxes for storage. Do not use extra large boxes as they become too heavy to lift and maneuver. Do not use garbage bags.

Hearing aids are also collected and given to PA Lions Hearing Research Committee who provide them to a research lab in Western PA.

You can bring collected eyeglasses to District Meetings for pickup; drop off at PA Lions State Office, 949 East Park Drive, Harrisburg; drop off at my home, 6088 Molly Pitcher Hwy South, Chambersburg.

Central Dauphin School District Teacher of the Visually Impaired, Rhonda Salak, attended the September, 2022 meeting of the West Hanover Township Lions Club to thank the Lions for their \$500 donation to the CDSD Vision Program, and to show Lions how their support helps students with visual impairments. Mrs Salak demonstrated how the iPad computer's talking and large print features benefit primary and secondary school students who have visual impairments.

In addition to supporting students with visual impairments, the West Hanover Lions annually fund two \$1,000 scholarships for high school graduates with visual impairments and for grads pursuing higher education in a program related to environmental studies; as well as another \$500 grant for the Central Dauphin School District Autism Support Program.

The West Hanover Lions also make contributions: to support cutting edge equipment at the Penn State Hershey Eye Center, to fund the West Hanover Senior Van Service, to help families affected by disasters, to assist community residents with visual needs, and to sponsor visually impaired campers at the PA Beacon Lodge Camp.
